## Message From The Chief of Police

The Leamington Police Service responded to virtually the same number of incidents during 2009 as in the previous year.

Reported Property Crime increased 17.5% over the previous year and the increase was relative to Break and Enter offences and Theft Under \$5,000. Other areas of property crime, such as Mischief and Theft of Vehicles, decreased by 49% and 30% respectively.

An increase in Violent Crime of 3.7% is mainly attributed to offences of Common Assault while Assault Level 2 decreased by 40%.

Overall in 2009 a total of 4,048 charges were laid, including a 10.5% (1,059) increase in Criminal Code charges over 2008.

An eighteen month Joint Forces Operation, "Project Alford", came to a successful conclusion in October. The project was a joint drug investigation by the Leamington Police Service and the Ontario Provincial Police targeting drug traffickers in the Leamington, Kingsville and Essex area of Essex County. The result of the investigation was a combined total of 68 people being charged with 266 offences as well as a substantial quantity of drugs and assets being seized.

2009 marked the end of dispatch service agreements with the Essex Police Service and the Amherstburg Police Service. The agreements were in place since 2002 and all parties benefited during that time. The end of these agreements will result in the loss of \$450,000 in revenue for the police service in 2010.

The Leamington Municipal Council decided in December to enter into an agreement with the Ontario Provincial Police for the provision of police service in the coming year. It is now anticipated that the Leamington Police Service will be disbanded in the latter part of 2010.

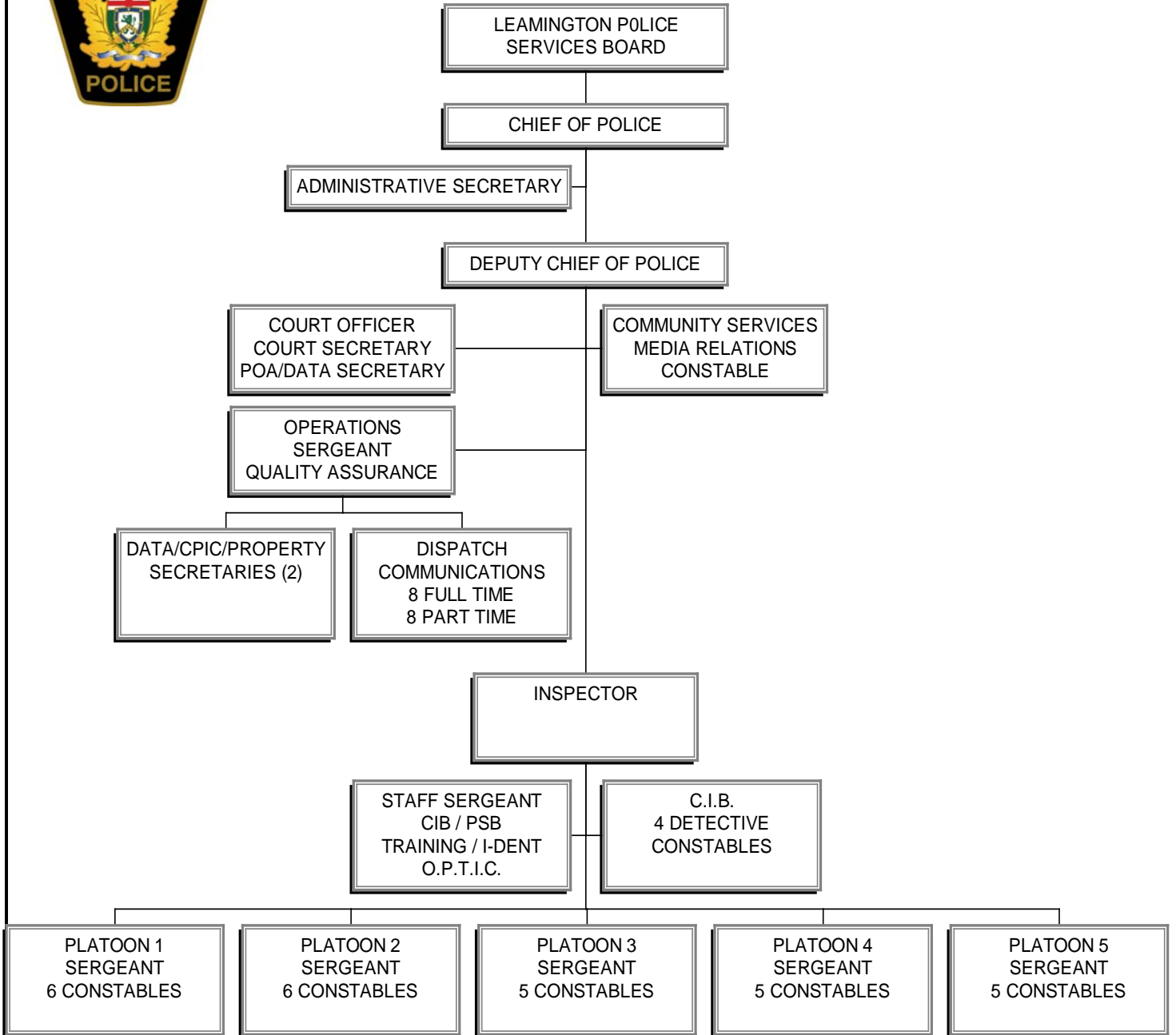

## COMMUNITY SERVICES & MEDIA RELATIONS 2009

### Schools

Community Services continues to be an integral part of the Leamington Police Services with much of the time devoted to the area schools, at the elementary and secondary level.

We are called upon to deliver a variety of presentations. Values, Influences and Peers is delivered at the grade 6 level to 13 different classes and has proven to be an extremely beneficial program. Over a 10 week period students are taught about peer pressure, decision making, shoplifting, vandalism, smoking, alcohol and drugs.

B-RAD (Bullying, Relationships, Alcohol and Drugs) which started as a pilot project at Leamington District Secondary School, Kingsville District Secondary School, and Sandwich Secondary School has now expanded and is delivered to grade 9's at all secondary schools in Windsor and Essex County.

We continue to spend one hour a day alternating between our two high schools between 11:00 am and noon during the students lunch breaks. This has proven to be extremely successful. When this program first started in the fall of 2008 both police and students were somewhat apprehensive. Since then, police are now accepted in the schools and the students have come to see police officers in a friendly, personal manner.

Throughout the year we are also called upon to speak to students of all levels, from J.K. right to grade 12 on a variety of topics.

### Committee Involvement

Our Community Services involves sitting on numerous committees some of which are E.C.H.O (Every Child Has Obstacles), Educate, Empower and Eliminate (Triple E). This is a committee comprised of both secondary schools, and public health to provide information to students about the dangers of drugs. We are currently planning a 'Drug Information' day on March 1st and 2nd of 2010.

We were on hand to assist picking up meals, shuttling people between venues and running various errands throughout the 3 day event.

### **Other Functions**

Over the course of the last year we continue to provide the public with as much information as we can as it relates to personal safety and providing information on protecting yourself from becoming a victim of crime. Identity Theft, phishing and other internet scams and frauds now seem to be common occurrences. We have made numerous presentations for various service clubs, businesses and banks. Facebook has exploded into our society which presents numerous concerns for parents and schools. Again, we have provided parents and schools with as much information as we can to prevent young people from being targeted by on-line criminals.

We also continue our involvement with WE Care for Kids, recognized as one of the fastest growing and highly respected area charities. The Leamington Police

continue to be a GOLD sponsor. Our 8th annual charity hockey game was played in February and \$25,000 was donated.

We were successful in obtaining a \$10,000 grant through the 'Civil Remedies Act' which was used to purchase a laptop and projector, along with anti drug materials (pens, pencils, buttons) to be distributed to area students.

## 2009 CIB Annual Report

The Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) is responsible for initiating investigations into criminal activity and for providing investigative support to the Uniformed Patrol Members. The CIB is made up of four Detective Constables and is supervised by a Staff Sergeant that assigns benchmark cases to investigate.

The members of Leamington Police CIB are responsible for investigating crimes such as homicides, sudden deaths, robberies, sexual assaults, serious assaults, child abuse, frauds, major break and enters, major property crimes and drug offences. The CIB officers have expertise or extensive knowledge in investigative techniques and the intricacies of follow-up investigations.

In 2009 the CIB unit has partnered with our local Probation/Parole officers to take a more strategic approach and to target specific high risk individuals, known offenders, and recidivist offenders. The goal of the unit is to prevent or interrupt the identified criminal activity and to step up enforcement efforts.

2009 saw the conclusion of "Project Alford", a eighteen month undercover investigation into the illicit drug culture in Leamington and southern Essex County. An officer was specifically responsible for investigating and enforcing Controlled Drugs and Substances Act that deal with trafficking. Our officer worked closely with members of the Ontario Provincial Police to determine the identity of persons and groups responsible for the importation and trafficking of illegal drugs and substances. Throughout the investigation our officer also worked diligently to ensure that the proceeds of such crimes were tracked and seized and removed the incentive to commit such crimes

Highlights of the investigation included the execution of ten search warrants and numerous arrests. Leamington Police and OPP investigators were assisted by approximately one hundred outside officers from various agencies and locations. Drugs seized during the investigation included:

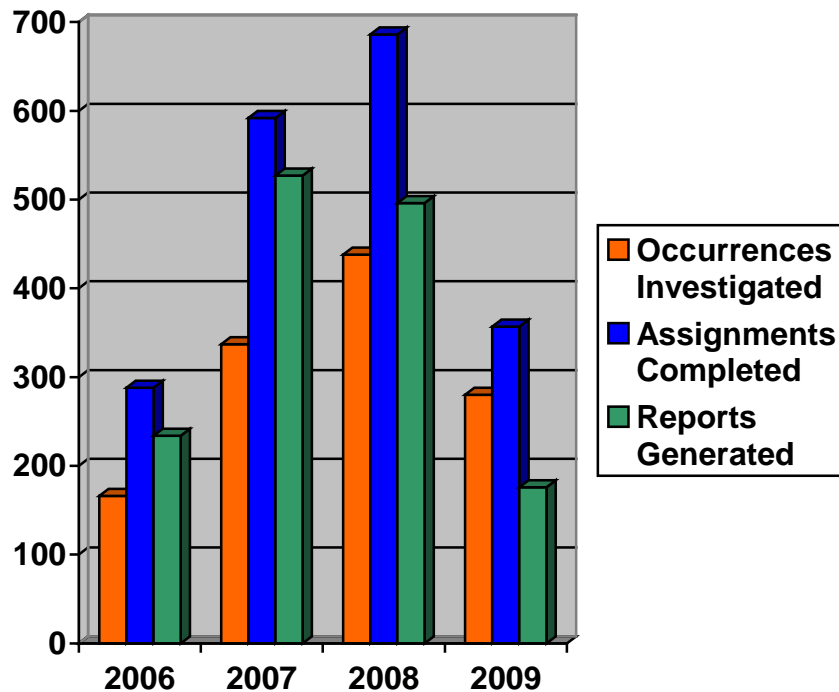
- Oxycodone pills
- Cocaine
- Crack cocaine
- Ecstasy
- Cannabis Marihuana
- Morphine pills

The approximate street value of drugs seized during the investigation was over \$200,000. Also seized were 5 vehicles, 20 long guns, 2 crossbows and over \$19,000 in Canadian Currency.

The project resulted in a total of 266 Controlled Drugs and Substances Act offences and Criminal Code offences, which included, Trafficking, Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking and Possession, Breach of Court Orders and Possession of Property obtained by crime.

The CIB was extremely busy throughout 2009. 280 Occurrences were investigated by the members in the unit (**\*Excluding "Project Alford Statistics"**). Members completed 357 Assignments that are associated with their investigations and filed 176 reports.

## USE OF FORCE REPORTING - 2009

Ontario Regulation 926/90 "*Equipment and Use of Force*" made under the Police Services Act, requires that a member of the Police Service submit a report to the Chief of Police whenever the member;

- a) draws a handgun or conducted energy weapon in the presence of a member of the public, excluding a member of the police service who is on duty;
- b) points a firearm at a person;
- c) discharges a firearm or conducted energy weapon;
- d) uses a weapon other than a firearm on another person; or
- e) uses physical force on another person that results in an injury requiring medical attention

The Leamington Police Service further breaks down the above requirements into the following more defined categories.

- a) Firearm - discharges
- b) Firearm - point at person
- c) Handgun - draw
- d) Conducted Energy Weapon
- e) Aerosol Weapon (O.C. Spray)
- f) Impact Weapon - Hard (Baton strike)
- g) Impact Weapon - Soft (Baton no strike)
- h) Empty Hand Techniques - Hard
- i) Empty Hand Techniques - Soft

During 2009 all uniformed Members of the Service successfully completed mandated "Use of Force" refresher training.

Members completed Use of Force Reports on nine (9) separate incidents. These have been reviewed, and while a number of force options may have been employed during each incident, for the purposes of this report, only the highest level of force used is being reported.

\* In 2009 there was an increase in the number of times uniformed Members were required to discharge their firearms. Four of the incidents were to destroy animals that had been injured, and one incident required a member to discharge his firearm at an armed person.

## Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (R.I.D.E.)

The 2009 RIDE program was funded again this year through a grant by the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services. This years grant, in the amount of \$13,330.57, has allowed the Service to conduct seven (7) RIDE checks.

This year saw an increase in the number of vehicles checked while at the same time saw decreases in all other areas. This is a clear indication that the RIDE program is working to reduce the number of impaired drivers on our roadways.

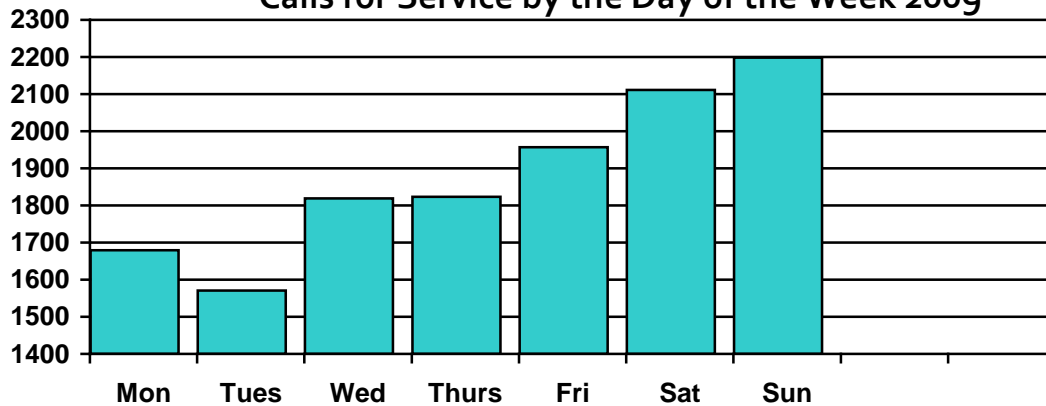

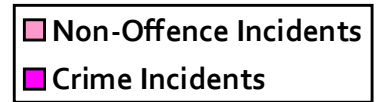
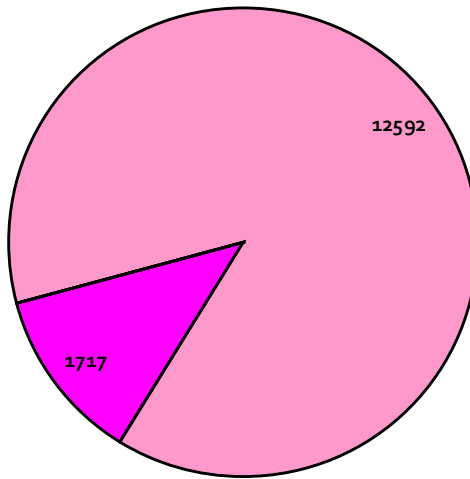
### Calls for Service by Month 2009



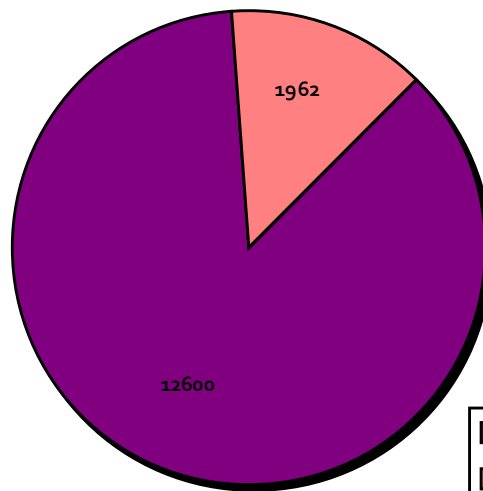
### Calls for Service by the Day of the Week 2009
